

## INSTRUCTIONS / NOTES FOR 2021-22 ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN PROGRESS REPORT (“APPR”)

1. In order to fulfill the requirement in the Charter Schools Act that each charter school in New York report its progress toward meeting academic goals annually, schools must report on student achievement and progress towards the goal areas included in their Accountability Plans. The SUNY Charter Schools Institute (the “Institute”) has modified the APPR template to include guidance on reporting both the traditional required measures aligned to the New York State 3<sup>rd</sup> – 8<sup>th</sup> grade assessments as well as internal examination results. The calculation of some metrics remains paused for 2021-22 and is clearly indicated in the template below. Where applicable, the Institute has provided modified guidance on how and what schools should report under each section.
2. Charter schools with Accountability Plans that contain additional measures beyond the required measures and/or conditions on renewal should report on these under the “Additional Content and Evidence” sections for each goal area.
3. While the Institute anticipates that the 3<sup>rd</sup> - 8<sup>th</sup> grade state test results from 2021-22 will form a new baseline for evaluating attainment of Accountability Plan goals, it remains imperative that schools continue to supplement these data with results from national norm-referenced tests or internally developed assessments under each goal area. At minimum, schools should include growth results under the “Internal Assessment Results” sections of the ELA and mathematics goal areas. Schools that wish to report additional internal exam results may use the sample tables available in Appendix A.
4. The deadline for submission of the APPR is September 16, 2022. Schools with extenuating circumstances may request an extension as necessary. As it does every year, the Institute will validate and post the finalized APPRs onto its website.
5. **Text Highlighted in Grey = explanation or guidance for an entry.** As guidance, schools should remove the existing text entirely and replace it with information to complete the report.
6. Schools serving students in 9<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grades additionally submit a student-level data file as part of the required annual reporting to the Institute. These data should align to and corroborate the high school achievement outcomes reported in the APPR. For example, the number of students included in the 2018 Total Cohort for Graduation and the 2021-22 four-year graduation rate reported in this document should be able to be calculated from this high school data submission.

## SCHOOL OVERVIEW

The mission of Harlem Village Academy East is to prepare students of fine character to graduate from college and make a positive contribution to society. In order to accomplish this mission, we have established clear, measurable goals, which are outlined in this document. The school leadership and faculty continually strive to maintain our community’s focus on achieving these goals. Harlem Village Academy East opened in the fall of 2005 with its first class of fifth graders. The charter is divided into three schools: 354 students in HVA East Elementary, 130 students in HVA West Middle, and 149 students in HVA High, shared with HVA west.

### ACCOUNTABILITY COHORT

The state’s Accountability Cohort consists specifically of students who are in their fourth year of high school after entering the 9<sup>th</sup> grade. For example, the 2018 state Accountability Cohort consists of students who entered the 9<sup>th</sup> grade anywhere sometime during the 2018-19 school year, were enrolled in the school on the state’s annual enrollment-determination day (BEDS day) in the 2021-22 school year, and either remained in the school for the rest of the year or left for an acceptable reason. Students are also included in the Total Cohort for Graduation (referred to as the Graduation Cohort, Total Graduation Cohort, or Total Cohort interchangeably throughout this report) based on the year they first enter the 9<sup>th</sup> grade. Students enrolled for at least one day in the school after entering the 9<sup>th</sup> grade are part of the school's Graduation Cohort. The school may remove students from the Graduation Cohort if the school has discharged those students for an acceptable reason listed in the SIRS manual, including but not limited to the following: if they transfer to another public or private diploma-granting program with documentation, transfer to home schooling by a parent or guardian, transfer to another district or school, transfer by court order, leave the U.S., or are deceased.

## PROMOTION POLICY

In order to graduate, students must successfully complete at least 22 credits as listed below:

4 English credits	3 Math credits	1 Art credit
4 Social Studies credits	1 World Language credit	0.5 Health Education credits
3 Science credits	2 Physical Education credits	3.5 Elective credits

Harlem Village Academy East strongly encourages students to enroll in English, History, Math, and Science courses for all four years of high school, and in World Language courses for three years. Students are considered to be promoted to the next grade level as long as they remain on track to graduate from high school in four years.

10th: In order to be considered a sophomore, students must successfully complete at least 5 credits.

11th: In order to be considered a junior, students must successfully complete at least 10 credits.

12th: In order to be considered a senior, students must successfully complete at least 15 credits.

## GOAL 1: HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION

### GOAL 1: HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION

Students will graduate from high school.

### Goal 1: Leading Indicator

Each year, 75 percent of students in first and second year high school Total Graduation Cohorts will earn at least ten credits (if 44 needed for graduation) or five credits (if 22 needed for graduation) each year.

## METHOD

This measure serves as a leading indicator of the performance of the high school cohort and examines students' progress toward graduation based on annual credit accumulation. The measure requires that, based on the school's promotion requirements, 75 percent of the first and second year high school Total Graduation Cohorts will earn the required number of credits.

## RESULTS AND EVALUATION

The table below displays the percent of students in each Accountability Cohort who remain on track to graduate within four years.

### Goal 1: Leading Indicator

Each year, 75 percent of students in the second year high school Total Graduation Cohort will score at or above proficient on at least three different New York State Regents exams required for graduation.

### METHOD

This measure serves as a leading indicator of the performance of high school cohorts and examines their progress towards graduation based on Regents exam passage. The measure requires that 75 percent of students in each Graduation Cohort have passed at least three Regents exams by their second year in the cohort.

As a result of the Board of Regents' guidance regarding the cancellation of multiple administrations of the Regents exams in 2019-20, 2020-21, and 2021-22 for the most recent second year cohort schools should report the percentage of students who either passed or were exempted from at least three exams. In August of 2022, the 2020 cohort will have completed its second year.

### RESULTS AND EVALUATION

The table below shows the percent of each cohort that passed three Regents exams by their second year in the cohort.

### ADDITIONAL EVIDENCE

Harlem Village Academy East exceeded the measure for the 2018 and 2019 cohorts, and did not meet the measure for the 2020 cohort. This is due to the fact that we did not prioritize meeting this measure as we invested our time, energy and resources fully into IB for All. Specifically, this was our first year transitioning from an IB/Regents school to a fully IB for All school. As such, we no longer prioritize Regent's preparation. HVA believes the International Baccalaureate offers a world class

college readiness curriculum and will be using the IB as our main assessment for all students effective this year.

During the 2019-20 and 2020-21 school years, most students in the 2018 and 2019 cohorts were exempted from at least three Regents exams. During the 2018-19 and 2021-22 school years, most students in the 2017 and 2020 cohorts were either not exempted from any Regents exams or were exempted from one or two Regents exams.

### Goal 1: Absolute Measures

Each year, 75 percent of students in the fourth year high school Total Graduation Cohort and 95 percent of students in the fifth year high school Total Graduation Cohort will graduate.

### METHOD

This measure examines students in two high school Graduation Cohorts: those who entered the 9<sup>th</sup> grade as members of the 2018 cohort and graduated four years later and those who entered as members of the 2017 cohort and graduated five years later. These data reflect August graduation rates. At a minimum, these students have passed or been exempted from five Regents exams required for high school graduation in ELA, mathematics, science, U.S. History, and Global History or met the requirements for the 4+1 pathway to graduation.<sup>1</sup>

The school's graduation requirements appear in this document above the graduation goal.

### RESULTS AND EVALUATION

The tables below show the four-year and five-year graduation rates for each cohort.

### Goal 1: Comparative Measure

Each year, the percent of students in the high school Total Graduation Cohort graduating after the completion of their fourth year will exceed that of the Total Graduation Cohort from the school district of comparison.

### METHOD

The school compares the graduation rate of students completing their fourth year in the charter school’s Total Graduation Cohort to that of the respective cohort of students in the school district of comparison. Given that district results for the current year are generally not available at this time, for purposes of this report schools should include the district’s 2020-21 results as a temporary placeholder for the district’s 2021-22 results.

### RESULTS AND EVALUATION

The tables below show the four-year graduation rates for each cohort for Harlem Village Academy East and Community School District 4.

Harlem Village Academy West met the measure for the 2016 and 2017 cohorts. Based on the 2020-21 New York State test scores, HVA met the measure for 2021-22.

### Goal 1: Absolute Measure

Each year, 75 percent of students in the high school Total Cohort pursuing an alternative graduation pathway (commonly referred to as the 4+1 pathway) will achieve a Regents equivalency score and pass an approved pathway assessment required for graduation by the end of their fourth year in the cohort.

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### METHOD

The New York State Board of Regents approved regulations establishing alternative pathways to graduation for all students. Students may replace one of the required Social Studies Regents exams with an approved alternative assessment. For more information about requirements and approved assessments refer to the NYSED resource online: <http://www.p12.nysed.gov/ciai/multiple-pathways/>. The school will document the names of the alternative assessments administered and success rate for students in the templates below.

As a result of the Board of Regents' guidance regarding the cancellation of multiple administrations of the Regents exams in 2019-20, 2020-21, and 2021-22 students planning to take a pathway examination during those cancelled dates would be exempted from the requirement. For purposes of this measure, only report results for students with valid scores for any pathway exam.

ACTION PLAN

GOAL 2: COLLEGE PREPARATION

Students will gain admission to college.

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### Goal 2: Absolute Measure

Each year, 75 percent of graduating students will demonstrate their preparation for college by at least one or some combination of the following indicators:

- Passing an Advanced Placement (“AP”) exam with a score of 3 or higher;
- Earning a score of 4 or higher on an International Baccalaureate (“IB”) exam;
- Passing a College Level Examination Program (“CLEP”) exam;
- Passing a college level course offered at a college or university or through a school partnership with a college or university;
- Achieving the college and career readiness benchmark on the SAT;
- Earning a Regents diploma with advanced designation; or,
- A different school-created indicator approved by the Institute.

### METHOD

Schools use any method listed here, or any combination thereof, to demonstrate that at least 75 percent of graduates are prepared to engage in rigorous college level coursework. The school should select only those methods listed here that it uses to demonstrate the college readiness of its students and eliminate those that it will not. For instance, high schools that do not deliver an IB Program as part of their high school design do not report on the IB option. The school reports on the number of students who attempted to achieve each indicator, the number who succeeded, and the corresponding percentage. Additionally, the school should report on the overall number of students who graduated after four years, the number of those graduates who achieved any of the relevant indicators, and the overall percentage achieving any indicator.

Harlem Village Academy East did not meet the measure. This is due to the fact that we did not prioritize meeting this measure as we invested our time, energy and resources fully IB for All. Specifically, this was our first year transitioning from an IB/Regents school to a fully IB for All school. In addition, in the last few years, selective and highly selective colleges have moved away from the SAT/ACT exams. As such, we no longer prioritize Regents or SAT preparation. HVA believes the International Baccalaureate offers a world class college readiness curriculum and will be using the IB as our main assessment for all students effective this year.

### Goal 2: Absolute Measure

Each year, the College, Career, and Civic Readiness Index (“CCCRI”) for the school’s Total Cohort will exceed the Measure of Interim Progress (“MIP”) set forth in the state’s ESSA accountability system.

The Institute does not require charters to report on this measure for 2021-22.

### Goal 2: Comparative Measure

Each year, the school’s CCCRI for the Total Cohort will exceed that of the district of comparison’s Total Cohort.

The Institute does not require charters to report on this measure for 2021-22.

### Goal 2: Absolute Measure

Each year, 75 percent of graduating students will matriculate into a college or university in the year after graduation.

## METHOD

The ultimate measure of whether a college prep high school has lived up to its mission is whether students actually enroll and succeed in college. Schools track and report the percentage of fourth-year Total Cohort graduates who matriculate into a two or four-year college program in the school year following graduation. Schools should update and confirm data for Cohorts prior to 2021-22 and provide preliminary matriculation data for 2018 Cohort. It may be necessary for schools to provide updated data to the Institute when National Student Clearinghouse or other data sources become available later in the school year.

### ACTION PLAN

### GOAL 3: ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

#### Goal 3: English Language Arts

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Students will meet or exceed state performance standards for mastery of skills and content knowledge in the area of English language arts. Students will also demonstrate proficiency in advanced skills in the area of English language arts necessary for admission into and success in college.

## BACKGROUND

The purpose of the HVA literacy curriculum is to develop sophisticated student thinking and a passion for reading. Students who are immersed in a book at school are more likely to continue reading during their free time, thereby reading an hour or more each day. When students are avid readers, they acquire a breadth and depth of knowledge and vocabulary as well as improving their fluency, grammar, and syntax—all of which organically strengthens their comprehension. This is accomplished through the core components of literacy instruction: independent reading, guided reading, close reading, read aloud, writing workshop, phonics and vocabulary. All these components were continued with remote learning during the 2021-22 school year.

## ELEMENTARY AND MIDDLE ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

### Goal 3: Absolute Measure

Each year, 75 percent of all tested students enrolled in at least their second year will perform at or above proficiency on the New York State English language arts examination for grades 3-8.

## METHOD

The school administered the New York State Testing Program English language arts (“ELA”) assessment to students in 3<sup>rd</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grades in spring 2022. Each student’s raw score has been converted to a grade-specific scaled score and a performance level.

The table below summarizes participation information for this year’s test administration. The table indicates total enrollment and total number of students tested. It also provides a detailed breakdown of those students excluded from the exam. Note that this table includes all students according to grade level, even if they have not enrolled in at least their second year (defined as enrolled by BEDS day of the previous school year).

### BACKGROUND

HVA has strategically designed a sophisticated scope and sequence and curricular materials. For workshop, our curriculum is sequenced uniquely for HVA, but pulls resources from Eureka, Children’s Mathematics, Contexts for Learning Mathematics, and Fosnot’s work from the series Young Mathematicians at Work. Our workshop curriculum is also adapted year to year based on teacher feedback and student mastery. Our problem solving and fluency resources are teacher created, pulling inspiration from many resources. Students are deeply engaged in problem solving, reasoning, proving, and discussing mathematics. Student work is aligned with grade level tasks that connect to a clear trajectory of long- and short-term learning targets. The questions and tasks posed to students elicit the use of higher order thinking skills for all students. Our mathematics program includes the following components: Fluency, Problem Solving, Jars, Routines and Games and math workshop.

## ELEMENTARY AND MIDDLE MATHEMATICS

### Goal 4: Absolute Measure

Each year, 75 percent of all tested students enrolled in at least their second year will perform at or above proficiency on the New York State Mathematics examination for grades 3-8.

### METHOD

**Goal 6: Comparative Measure**

Each year, the percent of students in the high school Total Cohort passing the Regents Global History exam with a score of 65 or above will exceed that of the high school Total Cohort from the school district of comparison.

The Institute does not require charters to report on this measure for 2021-22.

**GOAL 7: ESSA**

Due to COVID-19 and the subsequent changes to the state’s testing, accountability, and federal reporting requirements, the 2021-22 school accountability statuses are the same as those assigned for the 2020-21 school year. **Goal 7: Absolute Measure**

Under the state’s ESSA accountability system, the school is in good standing: the state has not identified the school for comprehensive or targeted improvement.

## METHOD

Because *all* students are expected to meet the state's performance standards, the federal statute stipulates that various sub-populations and demographic categories of students among all tested students must meet the state standard in and of themselves aside from the overall school results. As New York State, like all states, is required to establish a specific system for making these determinations for its public schools, charter schools do not have latitude in establishing their own performance levels or criteria of success for meeting the ESSA accountability requirements. Each year, the state issues School Report Cards that indicate a school's status under the state accountability system.

## RESULTS AND EVALUATION

Based on 2019-20 results and 2020-21 assigned accountability status, Harlem Village Academy East is in "Good Standing" for the 2021-22 school year.
